Region 11 (Larue County) ~ Kindergarten Prep Programs Give Children a Good Start

Hodgenville (KY) • Hodgenville Elementary Family Resource Center and Abraham Lincoln Elementary Family Resource Center provide a weekly program called WEE Time. This program is for children ages 2 until starting school and their caregivers. Weekly activities include cutting, singing color songs, making a craft, center time, singing the alphabet song, learning about numbers and shapes, and snack time. The program alternates between the two

schools every Thursday during the school year from 9:00-10:30 a.m. Our goal is to help build self-esteem, develop social skills, and to show caretakers skills to use when spending time and/or working with the child so that children entering kindergarten will be well-prepared. At each session, fun educational material is also sent home to be completed by the family.

Hodgenville Elementary Family Resource center also provides a program called Kindergarten Here I Come! (KHIC). The program is only for those children who will be starting school the following school year. KHIC meets on Wednesday's from 9:00 – 10:30 a.m. It focuses on what a child needs to know when starting kindergarten. Topics that are covered are: writing their name in upper and lower case letters, writing and recognizing the alphabet, color and number words. More advanced cutting sheets and beginning sight words are also stressed. Both programs are sponsored by the family resource centers of Larue County and United Way of Central Kentucky.

Region 3 (Jefferson County) ~ FRCs Host Medieval Madness at the Frazier Museum

On October 26th, 300 families received free admission to the Frazier museum thanks to the generous funding by the Metro EAF "Bridge to History" grant. Others were covered by FRYSC grants, Title I Parent Involvement or received a discounted admission rate. The total number of children and parents that participated in this event neared 500. The event was well received by all that attended and for many it was the first time that they were able to experience the Frazier Museum.

Families were able to view museum exhibits, go on a medieval scavenger hunt, enjoy the storytelling of Brave Martha and the Dragon in the theatre as well as a live performance of "Arming the Knight" and "Medieval Sword and Buckler." They had the opportunity to visit the hands-on armor station to see what it would feel like to wear armor.

Families were challenged to participate together in the "Medieval Math Games" and the "Move to Read" rooms. Information and representatives from ECHO, 4C's and the Extension Office were available to explore healthy nutrition, child safety and the importance of Early Development as well as ages and stages. The event offered an opportunity for families to enjoy a day together and explore ways to help their children in many fun and interactive ways.

She weighs all those interested with a Body Mass Index Scale and is the only one viewing our actual weight. She then calculates their actual Body Mass Index what it is and what it should be. Everyone wishing to participate donates \$5 then the following month whoever improves their BMI the most wins the money. Several parents met their students at the event site to enjoy the activities with them! Students surveyed regarding the program reported increased awareness of safety hazards they face and increased preparedness to deal with emergency situations.

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
